

EVENTS AND MARKETING

Purpose of Report: For information only.

1. PAST EVENTS

- 1.1 The Christmas Torchlight Procession and Carols was a very successful event. The number of attendees was estimated at 1500 which is the largest to date. The Grove Theatre pantomime stars and special guest Melody from CBeebies was very well received from the audience. The lightshow finale has received excellent feedback from the schools, the audience and on social media. The event was enhanced with the expanded Christmas Market down Middle Row, feedback from the stalls and late-night shops who opened on the night is that they traded very well.
- 1.2 The road closure caused minimal disruption and was closed at 6.45 pm and reopened once again at 8.15 pm. The new layout in The Square along with the road closure had a very positive impact to the event. This will be replicated in the 2020 event planning. More decorative lighting will also be looked at to enhance the Square further.

2. SOCIAL MEDIA

2.1 Facebook currently has 7,175 followers which is an increase of 2,000 followers from this time last year. The total number of 'Likes' has also increased from 3907 to 6907. The number of Twitter followers for the five DTC twitter accounts are -

4. SURVEY MONKEY

4.1 For the year 2019, a total of 378 surveys have been collected via Survey Monkey. This figure is a drop from total numbers collected last year, however this could be due to the cancellation of St George's day and the change of the August Priory Picture's event date due to adverse weather.

- 4.2 Overall, 99% of people surveyed were satisfied or very satisfied with the event programme, this is an increase of 1% from responses collected in 2018. Please see Appendix 1 and 2 for the full questionnaire results.
- 4.3 Social media, Facebook and Talk of The Town are still the most effective forms of marketing for the events programme. This is highlighted by Question 6. "How did you hear about the Dunstable Town Council Events Programme?" Results collected show that 79% of people heard through Facebook and 29% through Talk of The Town.

Leaflets and banners are only at 8.5%, but this is hoped to increase with the $25 \times A5$ leaflet stands now in placed at strategic locations in Dunstable.



Q1 Which event(s) have you attended this year?



Q2 Where have you travelled from today? Please enter your postcode.



Q3 How likely are you to recommend Dunstable events to a friend?





Q4 What is your age?





Q6 How did you hear about the Dunstable Town Council Events Programme?



Q7 Are there any other forms of advertising that you think Dunstable Town Council should consider in the future?



Q8 Why did you choose to attend the above event(s)? (Tick all statements that apply).







GROVE CORNER AND COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

Purpose of Report:

1. GROVE CORNER FIGURES

- 1.1 Grove Corner has received 212 visits from young people with 0 new sign ups since the last report up to and including Friday 20 December 2019. Numbers are recorded through a head count by officers and staff.
- 1.2 Junior youth club numbers are steady with an average of 18 attending the Friday evening sessions.
- 1.3 The transition group is working well with an average of 7 staying for this session each week.
- 1.4 There have been 9 Junior sessions and 11 Senior and transition sessions since the last report to this Committee.
- 1.5 Grove Corner now has 524 Facebook 'Likes' and Grove Corner's Instagram now has 195 followers.
- 1.6 Pokémon Club was closed for the Christmas holidays but is still attracting good numbers.
- 1.7 SORTED Counselling Services

Please see below for figures from 17 October to 10 December:

Hours Offered – 189 Hours Cancelled/DNA - 52 Hours Attended - 137

New clients - 12 Clients started counselling before above date - 25 Totalling - 37 clients seen

1.7.1 SORTED have given 3 months' notice of their intention to vacate Grove Corner at the end of March 2020. A copy of the notice letter is attached as Appendix 1. This has no financial implication as DTC receives no income from SORTED for use of the premises. The counselling rooms will be advertised for hire and a decision will be made on use of the rear office once the new structure is in place.

- 1.8 The daytime hire of Grove Corner remains at 4 days a week.
- 1.9 Mind BLMK will be starting a new group on 13 January in Grove Corner called 'Minds Matter' from 6.00 pm to 8.00 pm. This will then take place regularly on the second Monday of each month. Their target group are 17 to 25-year olds. It will be a social games evening with support for mental health and wellbeing.

2. GROUNDWORK

2.1 The last Groundwork session took place on Friday 20 December. They said their goodbyes with a Christmas themed party. The Friday evening sessions will now continue with DTC staffing.

3. YOUTH ENGAGEMENT

3.1 DTC officers gave an assembly to Beecroft Academy on 4 December to promote Grove Corner. This included the facilities Grove Corner offers and what sessions are planned come 2020.

4. NATIONAL YOUTH WORK WEEK

4.1 This year's National Youth Work week was celebrated in Central Bedfordshire area with a Youth Awards ceremony. This took place at the Rufus Centre in Flitwick on Monday 4 November. One of our young volunteers won an award for best Youth Volunteer, presented by Dunstable's Mayor, both she and her family were delighted with this recognition of her achievements.

5. FAMILY ACTIVITIES

- 5.1 The team provided free Christmas arts and crafts activities for 100 children at the Santa's House Party in Priory House on Saturday 7 December. This was very well received from all who attended.
- 5.2 The next free family fun event will take place on 21 February at Creasey Park Community Football Centre. Once again, this event will cater for 50 young people and their parents/carers.

6. COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

6.1 Beecroft Residents Association (BRA)

Beecroft Residents Association took part in the Christmas tree festival at Priory House on Saturday 7 December. The group decorated Christmas themed rocks which several people enjoyed seeing.

6.2 Downside Residents Association

Downside Residents Association, with the help of local community groups, planted 500 spring bulbs on the green at the junction of Mayfield Road an Oakland Avenue on 9 November. This activity was part of the Dunstable In Bloom campaign.

Their annual Christmas Lunch took place in St Augustine's Church on Friday 29 November, 45 local people attended, and the event was enjoyed by all.

6.3 In Bloom

Officers worked with 16 young people from Weatherfield Academy to plant 500 spring bulbs in Olma Road recreation ground on 7 November. The bulbs were planted in between the orchard trees pupils helped to plant last year. The group also took part in some arts and crafts activities so they each had something to take home.

Many of the community groups involved in the Wheelie Fantastic project have replanted their wheelbarrows up for the winter.

6.4 Friends of Dunstable Cemetery

Friends of Dunstable Cemetery continue to organise and run tidy up events. The group have a Facebook page which has attracted several people who support the groups activities. Tidy up events will take place twice a month and general meetings will be every other month from January. The group are planning to run two workshops for schools and one for adults including a walk around the cemetery. They will also attend the 'Love your garden' market event on Saturday 9th May to promote the group.

OLDER PEOPLE'S DAY CARE SERVICES

Purpose of report: For information only.

1. PROJECT MEMBERSHIP UPDATE

1.1 The Good Companions Club (GCC) has 24 members. 1 person is recovering from a broken hip and is hoping to return in the New Year. 2 new members have joined since the last report, one following an advert in Talk of the Town, the other was via a leaflet found in their Dr's surgery.

2. GENERAL UPDATE - Good Companions Club

2.1 Improved Quality of Life

One member commented that since she joined the Good Companions Club she has been given the opportunity to participate in so many things she hadn't even considered doing like arm chair based keep fit, craft sessions and following a visit from Jonquil Floral Design, flower arranging. She has also joined Contact the Elderly and now attends their Afternoon Tea session once a month. She commented that joining the Good Companions Club has opened up a whole new world to her.

2.2 Dignity & Respect

Officers have been able to support a member who has been suffering from a condition which was causing her stress and embarrassment. Officers were able to signpost her to the right place to obtain the help and support she needs. She now feels much happier and more confident about her situation.

2.3 Health & Emotional Wellbeing

Our longest serving member has recently been diagnosed with a terminal illness. She has spoken to officers about how much attending the Good Companions Club has meant to her over the years and how much it helped her through the loss of her husband when she first joined. She explained that talking to officers about her diagnosis is a great help as her family are very upset and she felt she didn't want to worry or upset them any more than they are already are. She has asked that she be allowed to attend the club until she is too unwell to do so. Officers have assured her that is fine.

2.4 Making a Positive Contribution

Students form Weatherfield Academy have been visiting the Good Companions regularly this year as part of their studies. These visits have benefitted both the students and the members. They have become firm friends and are now more

understanding of each other. Members have agreed to take part in quizzes and games formulated by the students as part of their course. They have very much enjoyed each other's company over the year and there are plans to continue this intergenerational socialisation in the new year.

3. CREASEY PARK COMMUNITY FOOTBALL CENTRE OVER 55's LUNCH CLUB

3.1 Creasey Park Community Football Centre Lunch Club now has 36 members with an average of 30 members attending each week. There are 19 people on the waiting list.

3.2 Improved Quality of Life

Following our Halloween 7th Birthday Party at the Creasey Park Lunch Club, one lady told officers that she went into the session that day feeling 88 but came out feeling 18 again due to the wonderful music, atmosphere and company. She commented that she never thought she would ever feel that way again and was very grateful to have been able to join the club.

3.3 Dignity & Respect

Officers have been able to secure wheelchair seating at the Grove Theatre for our visit on 19 December. This means that 2 people who would not usually choose to join us on such outings can now feel involved and part of the group, which they are very happy about and very much looking forward to.

3.4 Health & Emotional Wellbeing

Following on from a visit from Advice Central, one member has now been able to receive the help she needed to complete the necessary form to receive the correct benefits following the death of her husband last year. Officers were able to arrange for the officer from Central Bedfordshire Council to visit the lady in question whilst she was at the lunch club which the lady felt happy and comfortable with.

4. COFFEE MORNINGS

4.1 The November coffee morning, held at Holt Court attracted 15 attendants and was very well received. The warden has asked if we can provide one next year in Southwood Road. This event was supported by the SAFFA and Carers in Bedfordshire. The next one is scheduled for Tuesday 4 February at Grove Corner and will be supported by the Red Cross and Age UK.

5. ROCK & ROLL – AFTERNOON TEA

5.1 The second Rock & A Roll event is being planned for 11 February 2020. There are 50 tickets available at a charge of £10 per ticket to cover food and entertainment.

6. SEATED PILATES

6.1 A second 6-week seated Pilates ran from 7 November to 19 December with approximately 12 people attending each week.

1. OPERATIONAL ISSUES

2. TOURIST INFORMATION CENTRE AND RETAIL OUTLET

- 2.1 Stock is selling very well, and staff have restocked where possible.
- 2.2 Facebook advertising is continuing to be used as a good way to promote the gift shop. A newsletter promoting the gift shop was sent out by Mail Chimp once the stock was on display.
- 2.3 November and December's Showcase shelving has been full and trading well.

3. THE JACOBEAN ROOM

- 3.1 There are six confirmed weddings (with Registrar) several provisional wedding bookings for 2020.

4. EVENTS

- 4.1 Shop staff sold glow products at the Firework Display on Tuesday 5 November and took £1,330.00. At the Torchlight Procession on Friday 29 November £875 was taken on glow products up by £350 on the previous year.
- 4.2 Santa's House Party on Saturday 7 December and Sunday 8 December was a great

success. Takings were good in both the Tea Rooms and TIC. Santa's Grotto and the snow globe both proved very popular with 289 gifts given out by Santa on Saturday and 290 lollies given out by Santa on Sunday. In terms of income, £135 was taken on Saturday for the donkey rides and £287 on Sunday for the donkeys and gingerbread men decorating.

- 4.3 All the Events with Santa have been fully booked. Santa's Cinema showed Rudolph the Red Nosed Reindeer and a story was read at Breakfast with Santa. All the children received a gift from Santa. In total 64 children attended these events.
- 4.4 Festive Film Friday proved popular on 13 December with 16 attending, however on 20 December only 6 attended. In light of this is, if the event is repeated 2020 the focus will be on one main night.

5. PRIORY HOUSE TEA ROOMS

- 5.1 The Team at Priory House supported the Torchlight event and remained open on the Friday evening to serve hot and cold beverages and festive cakes. This was well attended by the general public on the evening and there was a record take of £478.59 between 6.00pm and 8.30pm.
- 5.2 Christmas Afternoon Teas started on 25 November and ran through until 30 December. The Tea Rooms served 169 Afternoon Teas this year which is up on the 150 last year.
- 5.3 Pudding Nights have been well received for the evenings of 5, 12 and 19 December with 156 people attending over the three sessions. In addition, the Mayor hosted a Pudding Night on Friday 13 December with 43 guests. This is a total of 199 compared to 202 last year

2 ASHTON SQUARE TOILETS

- 2.1 The refurbishment of the Ashton Square toilets is now complete. The Town Centre Officer worked closely with the team from CBC during the refurbishment. An official opening of the toilets organised with CBC will take place in the New Year
- 2.2 In September the toilets were assessed by the 'Loo of the Year' awards panel, who deemed the toilets to be of Platinum Standard which is up from the Gold Award received last year.

3 TOWN CENTRE

3.1 Christmas Window Competition

3.2 Christmas Magic

The Christmas Magic event on the Saturday 14 and Sunday 15 December was very popular. Saturday had 27 stalls booked along Middle Row and the Square. There were a couple of cancellations in the morning, but all had pre-paid. Sunday had a few more cancellations but again all had pre-paid, and there were 19 stalls along Middle Row and on The Square. Traders feedback is that they had a positive two days. Christmas Magic 2018 there were 19 stalls booked on the Saturday and 7 on the Sunday, this shows a positive increase in stalls for this year.

The Ferris wheel attracted a lot of attention due to the size and being visible from the road and was very well received by those who attended. The improved weather on Sunday saw an increase in attendance form Saturday with more family's attending.

Social media was very active over the weekend, pictures posted over the two days received positive responses from the public. There were over 6,000 views across all posts on Facebook.

The Town Centre Services Officer is confident that Christmas Magic 2020 will only grow and have even more stall bookings than this year.

1. ACTION RECOMMENDED

1.1 For members to consider and comment on draft budget proposals and fees and charges for the Community Services Department for 2020/21, summarised below and shown on the separate enclosures, and make recommendations to the Finance and General Purposes Committee accordingly.

2. INTRODUCTION

- 2.1 Members of the Council considered proposals for a draft 2020/21 revenue budget at the Council Meeting held on 2 December 2019.
- 2.2 At this meeting, members agreed a draft budget that accounted for:

Increased Revenue Expenditure

Increased revenue expenditure on existing revenue budget £173,488

Revenue savings/additional income

Identified revenue savings and increased income targets £154,605

2.3 This resulted in an anticipated revenue expenditure deficit of £18,883 that in turn would require an increase to the Dunstable Band D council tax of £1.44 for 2020/21. Members resolved that the 2020/21 revenue budget should be set at no more than a 1% per cent increase to the council tax charge. The enclosed draft budget papers reflect this decision and a balanced revenue budget has been presented.

3. COMMUNITY SERVICES BUDGET 2020/21

- 3.1 The proposed budget for the Community Services Department for 2020/21 presents a revenue cost to the Council of £823,061 that includes an income target of £236,894 giving a gross budget of £1,059,955.
- The following summarises the movements in the proposed budget for the Community Services Department for 2020/21.

Excluding staffing costs, the overall Community Services budget for 2020/21 has decreased by £41,468. This can be explained as follows:

The budget presented assumes this ongoing income from CBC. This summary also shows savings and income that will fund the new HSHAZ Programme Manager post but does not show the cost of the new post.

4. FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

4.1 If approved, the recommendations of this report contribute to the Council achieving their aspiration for no more than a 1% increase in the 2020/21 council tax charge.

5. POLICY AND CORPORATE PLAN IMPLICATIONS

5.1 The Council has set itself a number of challenges and aspirations as contained in the draft Corporate Plan 2020-23. These budget proposals accord with the aspirations contained within the Corporate Plan and will allow the Council to continue to grow and become more influential in terms of service delivery in the town for many years to come.

6. HEALTH AND SAFETY IMPLICATIONS

6.1 The draft general health and safety budget for 2020/21 has been maintained at the same rate set for 2019/20.

7. HUMAN RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS

7.1 The staffing costs as illustrated on the separate enclosure assume a minimum of a 3% pay award for all staff (actual pay awards may be different including those positions that are paid the 'National Living Wage Foundation Living Wage' which will increase by approximately 3.3% from £9.00 to £9.30 per hour).
