GROVE CORNER AND COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

Purpose of Report:

1. GROVE CORNER FIGURES

- 1.1 Grove Corner has received 184 visits from young people with 12 new sign ups since the last report up to and including Friday 14 February 2020. Numbers are recorded through a head count by officers and staff.
- 1.2 Junior youth club numbers are steady with an average of 20 attending the Friday evening sessions.
- 1.3 The transition group is working well with an average of 7 staying for this session each week.
- 1.4 There have been 6 Junior sessions and 6 transition sessions since the last report to this Committee.
- 1.5 Grove Corner now has 531 Facebook 'Likes' and Grove Corner's Instagram now has 202 followers.
- 1.6 Pokémon Club is still attracting good numbers with additional enquires each month.
- 1.7 SORTED Counselling Services

Please see below for figures from 11 December to 17 February:

Hours Offered – 136 Hours Cancelled/DNA - 26 Hours Attended - 110

New clients - 13 Clients started counselling before above date - 19 Totalling - 32 clients seen

- 1.7.1 This will be the last report from SORTED as they will vacate Grove Corner at the end of March 2020.
- 1.8 The daytime hire of Grove Corner remains at 4 days a week.
- 1.9 Mind BLMK have started their 'Minds Matter' group in Grove Corner, which takes place on the second Monday in the month from 6.00 pm to 8.00 pm. Their target

group are 17 to 25-year olds. It has been a slow start, but it is expected that numbers will grow.

- 1.10 Sight Concern are holding a regular Family Group session on the 1st Saturday of each month in Grove Corner 10.00 am to 12 noon. This is for families who have a child or parent with visual impairment.
- 1.11 Mind BLMK are running the first of two funded support groups for those who have issues with hoarding at Grove Corner on Thursday afternoons. Both this and the next 6 week session, which will start in May, are fully booked and a waiting list has been established. Mind BLMK are hoping to get additional funding to run this much needed service again.

2. YOUTH ENGAGEMENT

- 2.1 On 7 February officers prepared a display for Safer Internet Day and played related games with the young people at the junior and transition sessions. This was to encourage them to think about what personal information they put out on social media and how to stay safe.
- 2.2 On 14 February officers ran a Valentine themed session for both juniors and transition group. Although light-hearted, an underlying message around healthy relationships was addressed.

3. FAMILY ACTIVITIES

3.1 The team provided a free February half term arts and crafts activity for 50 children at Creasey Park Community Football Centre. This was very well received from all who attended.

4. **COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT**

4.1 Summer Activities

Officers have been busy planning this year's summer activities programme. Initial meetings have been held with partners for National Play day and B-Fest. It is anticipated that the completed programme will be ready to advertise in the next edition of Talk of the Town.

4.2 Great British Spring Clean

Officers are working in partnership with two Dunstable Children Centres to facilitate a litter pick. One will take place on Tuesday 24 March meeting at Beehive Children Centre 3.30 pm to 5.00 pm and the other on Wednesday 25 March meeting at Downside Children Centre 3.30 pm to 5.00 pm. Both will be supported by Keep Dunstable Tidy.

4.3 In Bloom

Wheelie Fantastic- several groups have expressed interest in the wheelie fantastic project for 2020. Officers have contacted all previous participants. The theme for this year is pollinators and wildflowers.

4.4 Friends of Dunstable Cemetery

Friends of Dunstable Cemetery continue to organise and run tidy up events, and this has attracted 4 new members. The group are busy planning fund raising activities and events, including a stall at Love Your Gardens themed market on 9 May. They have launched their 'Adopt a Grave scheme' and have received a donation from the Dunstable branch of the Royal Antediluvian Order of Buffaloes. Their Facebook page now has 51 likes

OLDER PEOPLE'S DAY CARE SERVICES

Purpose of report: For information only.

1. PROJECT MEMBERSHIP UPDATE

1.1 The Good Companions Club (GCC) has 22 members. There has been one new member since the last report and one new enquiry. There is potentially one place available.

2. GENERAL UPDATE - Good Companions Club

2.1 Improved Quality of Life

The Daughter of a current member has contacted officers to say how much of a difference attending the Good Companions Club has made to her Mum. She said she is now more outgoing and confident and has even walked into town to visit the hairdresser. The family are very pleased with her progress.

2.2 Dignity & Respect

Following a recent visit from a scam awareness officer, one member said that he had been given the confidence to ask questions and know how to handle a potential telephone scam.

2.3 Health & Emotional Wellbeing

One gentleman has recently been admitted to hospital following a serious illness, he has approached officers and asked if he can talk through his experience and his diagnosis. Officers were more than happy to listen and offer support where needed. The gentleman lives alone and has no family within the local area so was very grateful to have someone listen to his fears and worries. Officers were able to signpost him to PALS (Patient Advice and Liaison Service) for further help and support.

2.4 Making a Positive Contribution

Jill Organ from the British Red Cross visited the Good Companions Club again in January. This was a request from the group to talk about minor injuries that may occur at home and how to treat them. The group took part in quizzes following the session and said they now felt more confident to deal with any minor issues at home and to be able to help others where necessary.

3. CREASEY PARK COMMUNITY FOOTBALL CENTRE OVER 55's LUNCH CLUB

3.1 Creasey Park Community Football Centre Lunch Club now has 36 members with an average of 30 members attending each week. There are 19 people on the waiting list.

3.2 Improved Quality of Life

Members have recently taken part in several quizzes and games. They commented that such a simple and enjoyable thing makes such a difference and tests them which they really need and enjoy.

3.3 Dignity & Respect

Officers were able to support one particular member who suffers from Dementia by making contact with her son to inform him that his Mother didn't seem well at lunch club. Following a visit to her GP, she was prescribed antibiotics for an infection.

3.4 Health & Emotional Wellbeing

Officers were able to arrange for someone to visit the Creasey Park over 55's lunch club to talk about essential oils and how they can help common ailments alongside traditional medicines. 10 people sought advice and all of those people have now gained help through essential oils. Mainly for the relief of arthritic pain. All members were encouraged to seek advice from their GP before using any of the treatments.

4. COFFEE MORNINGS

4.1 The February coffee morning, held at Grove Corner, was well attended. There were many familiar faces but also some new ones. Age UK supported the event and were able to offer advice and support. The next coffee morning is due to be held on 17 March at the United Services Club and will be supported by the Red Cross and Bedfordshire Fire service.

5. ROCK & ROLL - AFTERNOON TEA

5.1 The second Rock & Roll event took place on 11 February and was a great success. 50 tickets were sold with 47 attending on the day. Those who did not attend were unable to do so through illness. The next event is due to take place in October and will have a Country theme.

6. NEW LUNCH CLUB

6.1 Following a request from members at the last Community Services Committee, officers explored a number of different venues as a possible location for a new lunch club to ease the waiting list of Creasey Park Lunch Club. A meeting was held with the manager of The Saracens Head who is very keen to work in partnership with DTC. As a result, a trial period will commence in April with a view to reach a breakeven figure of 22. The venue has the capacity to take more than this which will allow the lunch club to grow. A report will be brought to a future committee meeting with a recommendation should this prove viable.

1 MARKETS

1.1 Themed Market

2 **ASHTON SQUARE TOILETS**

- 2.1 The refurbishment of the Ashton Square toilets is now complete. The Town Mayor & Cllr Ghent (CBC) will officially open the toilets with a ribbon cutting on 4 March at 10.00am. A commemorate opening plaque has been commissioned which will be displayed outside the toilets.
- 2.2 In efforts to increase recycling at council sites, recycle bins will be added to the Ashton Square toilets.
- 2.3 The Town Centre Services Officer has been looking at twinning toilets with Uganda. A donation of £60 supports building a toilet in remote areas. Each toilet that is twinned will have up dates on the building of a new toilet and a google GPS to keep track of the works in the area.

3 TOWN CENTRE

3.1 To build on the success of Christmas Magic, the Town Centre Services Officer is already exploring ways to expand the event next year with staging, more stalls and the return of the carousel and Ferris wheel. Support funding opportunities will be explored in order to keep the event free.

3.2 Christmas Lights

The Christmas light this year have had positive comments and some constructive feedback on improvements.

The new lights on the Priory House Christmas tree had very positive feedback from the public and the main Christmas tree was bigger this year which had an impact on the Christmas lighting budget. There are plans to increase lighting on the Square, to compliment increased popularity the Square now brings with its events programme and themed markets.

The Town Centre Officer is also looking at carbon footprint Christmas Trees and exploring alternative options such as artificial and using trees already in place.

Lamps and Tubes, the Town Councils lighting contractor have confirmed that the main high street and town decorations are coming to the end of their life cycle. The small tree that sits on Grove House is looking poor overshadowed compared to the new lights in Priory House. A more fitting tree to decorate would be the large Christmas tree that is growing to the rear of Grove House which would have a more dramatic impact on the town lighting.

A review of the Christmas lighting needs to take place to look at areas where illumination can be improved. The current condition of the lights and bulbs and whether new LED lighting could assist in the Town Council Corporate Plan commitment to becoming carbon neutral will be explored. Also, any new lighting may need new and strategically place power sources.

Members may wish to consider establishing a small Working Group to oversee this lighting review.

3.3 Events on the Square

3.3.1 The Square will hold a 'VE Day' on 9 May which will be complimented by three other events taking place on this day, 'Love Your Garden', 'Middle Row Market' and 'Around the World' in Priory Garden.

VE Day will see The Square set as a street party with bunting, free tea & cakes as well as music and games for families to enjoy. All the games and entertainment will have a World War II theme.

Ashton Square Day on 29 August will bring the past and future of Ashton Square together. Staging on the Square will see local community groups entertain the public, building on the success this brought during the 'Weird and Wonderful' event. Local shops and business will be asked to take part to help demonstrate how shops have changed within the area over the years. To promote the history of the area information boards will surround the square and the Town Centre Officer will be sourcing a local petting farm, to showcase the types of animals that were on sale when the Square was a used as cattle market. This will also serve as part of the emerging Heritage Action Zone community engagement programme.

3.4 Partnership Working

3.4.1 On 4 April partnership working between the Quadrant, DTC's Town Centre, Community & Young Peoples and Priory House services will deliver an Easter event. The Quadrant will be supplying an empty shop for DTC to provide free arts and crafts and a town centre treasure hunt. The empty shop will be decorated by the participating children and on display over the Easter holidays.

Meetings have taken place and further arranged in order to work and align projects more closely with Stevenage Leisure and Dunstable Library during the year.

3.5 People and Places

3.5.1 People and Places have again been commissioned to complete a Town Centre Benchmarking survey the Business Confidence survey. Questions have been reviewed and updated along with new questions relating to and to benchmark the impact of the HSHAZ project. The survey will be completed in March using social media and paper formats. The Town Centre Officer will be asking all Cafes to hand out the public surveys and collect the completed surveys.

4. TOWN CENTRE VACANCY RATES

- 4.1 The vacancy rates to the end of January 2020 are provided below. The count will be undertaken again at the start April 2020.
- 4.2 The town centre area used for the survey includes properties in High Street North up to Regent Street, High Street South to Friars Walk (excluding Thames Industrial Estate), Church Street up to and including Aldi and West Street up to the Police Station/St Mary's Gate.
- 4.3 Eleanor's Cross, Ashton Square, Albion Street, The Quadrant and Grove Park (including ASDA) have been included but rates can be calculated with or without these properties.
- 4.4 These figures have been shared with Central Bedfordshire Council officers.
